- Carry out an inception meeting to ensure clear understanding of the TORs and expected outcomes and deliverables.
- Conduct a review of updated books, brochures, trainings, policy briefs, published and unpublished studies, and reports issued by governmental and non-governmental organizations, as well as those issued by Donors, INGOs and the United Nations agencies in Lebanon.
- Develop methodology on a search for the various definitions and uses of GBV terms relevant to the different sectors to be conducted through surfing relevant internet web- pages, including those of the United Nations organizations, international organizations working in this field, in addition to pages of academic institutions and CSOs working on this issue.
- Produce a revised lexicon including GBV terms relevant to different sectors and share it with national stakeholders for input and feedback. The lexicon should include relevant GBV terms used in English, Arabic, and French.
- Review and finalize the lexicon based on partners and stakeholders' feedback.
- Validate the lexicon in a meeting with relevant stakeholders.
